Wolvey Parish Council is delighted to report that it has been awarded the status of Quality Parish Council.

The Quality Parish Council award is a government scheme which sets the standard for Parish Councils across the country. The aim is to enable Parish Councils, of all sizes, to demonstrate they are well run, operate efficiently, and work with the community to improve services.

In recent years, Wolvey Parish Council has been working hard towards meeting the required standard, so it is satisfying to know that all this effort has now been recognised by an independent panel.

To attain this award, a number of tests must be achieved and a portfolio of evidence presented to an accreditation panel. These tests are designed to show that the work of the Parish Council goes beyond its statutory duties.

All this means that Wolvey residents can have confidence that their Parish Council is properly managed, upholds a high standard of conduct and works closely with the community to represent its needs.

Benefits of the award are that the Council has greater credibility and the community has an accessible and responsive Council. It is a big step towards enhanced partnership with the principal authorities (Rugby Borough Council and Warwickshire County Council), as they can be confident that the Council is competent and capable of working with them to deliver improved services. Also, there are some grants which are only available to Quality Parish Councils.

The QPC hallmark recognises that the people of Wolvey can be sure that their Parish Council will continue to provide value for money and community leadership in an open and transparent manner for the benefit of the whole community. That's why quality counts.

#### Wolvey welcomes new Parish Councillor



Following the notice placed in the last newsletter, the Parish Council was very pleased to receive an unprecedented five applications from residents wishing to join the Parish Council. All the candidates provided strong reasons to support their application. However, following interviews and a vote the Council decided to co-opt Mr Ron Podesta to fill the vacancy.

Ron is retired and has lived in Wolvey for 30 years. His interests are the environment and community support for the aged and less able. It was these that motivated him to stand for the Parish Council. He hopes to contribute something to the community and village life he has enjoyed in Wolvey. We welcome Ron. He is already making a contribution, being a member of the co-ordinating group for the Summer Festival and joining the Environment Group.

## Save lives be a First Responder

Most victims of cardiac arrest survive if they can be treated quickly with a defibrillator. Community First Responders are voluntary members of the community who are trained by the Ambulance Service in the use of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED).

This is a very simple item of equipment to use that shocks the heart in cases of Cardiac Arrest, thus increasing the patient's chance of survival within the crucial early minutes. The training First Responders receive is a nationally recognised qualification which also includes CPR and first aid skills.

Community Responders do not take the place of the arrival of an Ambulance but bridge the gap between the 999 call and the Paramedics arriving. In rural areas, like Wolvey, the delayed response time for an ambulance can mean that a local first responder scheme has the potential to save lives within our community.

We have received a grant to fund the purchase of the necessary equipment, but we urgently need more volunteers if we are to get this up and running. This can be anyone who is reasonably fit and healthy and between 18 and 70 years of age. No previous experience or medical training is needed.



This means that the day for refuse collection in Wolvey will be changing to **MONDAYS** from that date.

## Village Link Bus Service for Wolvey

Rugby Volunteer Centre operates local bus service called Village Link. The routes are chosen to enable people in villages to travel to various towns and supermarkets. So far, Wolvey has not been included in this scheme, but it may be possible to request routes which incorporate Wolvey if we can demonstrate a demand.

There is currently a fortnightly service from Ansty / Shilton to Bedworth on Fridays which might be persuaded to come to pick up in Wolvey. Other buses travel to Fosse Park and various supermarkets. If we can show sufficient need, it might be possible to arrange a bus specifically from and to Wolvey. These buses are subsidised by Warwickshire County Council. The national bus pass can be used and fares are reasonable even for those who do not have a bus pass. It might also be possible to get these buses to pick up from outlying parts of the Parish such as Wolvey Heath and Hinckley Road.

# Summer Festival Plans and Progress

A Summer Festival is being organised for June 20<sup>th</sup> 2009. This date coincides with the opening of the Wetlands Boardwalk and the Church Flower Festival. It is an opportunity for residents and visitors to wander around Wolvey and see and experience what our community has to offer but most of all it is to HAVE FUN. All 27 of our groups and organisations have been invited to take part and a fantastic number have already expressed a keen interest to be involved in the event.

The Boardwalk on the Wetlands will be formally opened in the morning and the rest of the day will be filled with events and activities for all to enjoy.

So far, the Bowls Club will be opening their green for people to try their skill, The Tai Chi Ch'uan are giving a demonstration in the morning and you can join in. We are hoping that the Gurkha's pipers will be in

attendance with a blow up Army Assault Course and a climbing wall on the playing fields and we are also planning a roundabout and a bouncy castle.

There will be Cricket and Bowls games in the afternoon. The Women's Institute is providing refreshments in the Village Hall and the History group will have displays in the Baptist Chapel. The Guides, Scouts, Environmental Group and Neighbourhood Watch will also be putting on displays and activities. If any other local group or organisation would still like to take part, do get in touch.

We also wondered if any residents would like to open up their gardens, please let us know if you do.

The Parish Council set up two meetings to which all local groups and organisations were invited. Margaret

Cartwright, Bozena Kuncewicz, David Alford and Ron Podesta agreed to form a co ordinating group whose role is to promote the Festival, oversee schedules of activities to avoid 'clashes' and to prepare and distribute programmes including a map of the venues.

It would be very helpful if individuals, groups and organisations who are going to be involved in the Festival would let the Parish Clerk know the nature of their activity, venue and time by March 24<sup>th</sup> so that accurate details can be put in the programme.

We are working hard to make this Summer Festival a success and great fun. We hope all our fellow villagers will give their support on the day and perhaps this will become an annual event that celebrates the residents, groups and organisations in our vibrant community.

## What a difference a year makes


The Environment Group celebrated our first birthday in February, a whole year since we formed. It is hard to believe how quickly that year has gone, yet all around us we can see the difference we have made to the village surroundings.

The boardwalk, although not fully open over Christmas, as planned, is now fully operational. As this is being written, work is in progress to reinstate the two benches, so shortly it will be possible to sit and enjoy the peaceful and beautiful scenery of our unique wetland. Already this year, despite the extreme cold, snipe have been spotted there, newts are present, robins and wrens fly up to greet you as you walk. Also the resident woodpecker has been observed and a barn owl is often seen at dusk. In the snow, fox tracks were visible on the boardwalk treads, also many bird and fowl tracks, which told a tale of much activity there, super to see. Since the last newsletter, there have been two published articles about our wetland reserve. One in Country Matters magazine, and the second, in Warwickshire Wildlife News, written by Steven Falk, the Warwickshire Senior keeper of Natural History. He spoke very highly of our achievements so our fame continues to spread, all very

exciting for those involved. Plans are already in progress for the coming year; a great deal of work has already been done, including creating designs for new signage in the reserve. These are soon to go to the printers so look out for them as they will be very informative. The all important management plan and working document for the reserve has been formulated. This is great for reference when advice is needed. Members of our group will be attending various workshops at Brandon Marsh Nature Centre, to widen our knowledge of reptiles, insects and all things flora and fauna. Seeds are already purchased and awaiting planting for our village floral displays; more walks are at the mapping stage and a litter pick has been arranged for 4<sup>th</sup> April.

Our group continues to be as cheerful, good humoured and committed as ever, so why not come along and join us. Just ring Ruth on 221324 for more details, you will be very welcome.

The snowdrops the group planted on Temple Hill last year, as our very first project, have grown and look fabulous!

## Clerk's Corner - Margaret Cartwright reports

It is now more than two years since I became Wolvey Parish Clerk. A lot has happened since then and the role has changed and developed enormously. As I was completely new to the role, I have spent much of the time learning what is involved in the running of a Parish Council. In December, I completed a training course entitled 'Working With Your Council' and was awarded a certificate. Using this knowledge I then had the confidence to complete the portfolio required to apply for the Clerk's qualification the 'Certificate in Local Council Administration'. This involves compiling evidence, under 26 sections, to show that the Clerk knows and uses best practice in the administration of the Parish Council.

I was very pleased to learn, in January, that I have been awarded a Distinction in this qualification. It has been a lot of work, but I have found it very interesting and challenging and now feel in a much better position to help the Parish Council deliver the best services for the people of Wolvey.

It has been satisfying, recently, to see the successful culmination of some of the work we have been doing. The award of Quality Parish Council is a major achievement for the council. It involved fulfilling a number of criteria, compiling evidence to support the application and a meeting with the accreditation panel. This award means Wolvey can have confidence that its Parish Council operates in a professional, efficient and cost-effective manner.

The printing of the Parish Plan was a real milestone, after three years of dedicated effort by the Steering Group. The group consists of volunteers, who were all new to this process and should feel justifiably proud of their achievement. We hope you will find the document interesting and that it will be used to further improve and enhance life for Wolvey residents.

The construction of the boardwalk at the Old Cricket Field Wetland Reserve has been an amazing achievement for a team of volunteers. The project has generated much interest and its success is being recognised around Warwickshire, with articles in magazines such as Country Matters and Warwickshire Wildlife News.

The Parish Council consists of seven volunteers, who give their time to represent the needs and wishes of Wolvey residents. An important function of the Parish Council is to encourage cohesive, vibrant communities. Wolvey has traditionally been very good at this, having a number of active voluntary groups. But, new groups such as the Neighbourhood Watch and the Environment Group encourage even more involvement. A group to consider action for climate change is planned and, in June, an open weekend at the wetland and the Summer Festival will provide plenty of opportunity for even more people to make a contribution, no matter how small.

Although the Parish Council can take a lead and co-ordinate such events, they can only really succeed with the participation and support of the local community.
