WOLVEY'S FUTURE – PARTICIPATE IN THE PLAN

Under the Government's 'Duty to Co-operate', neighbouring planning authorities have to work together to fulfil development needs. As Coventry City Council cannot meet their entire housing needs within their own area, Rugby Borough Council needs to allocate sites for an additional 2,800 homes (over and above the Borough's own needs) between now and 2031. Rugby Borough Council cannot identify sufficient land to accommodate these homes within, or adjacent to, Rugby Town. Hence, it has looked to the main villages in the Borough to cover some of the shortfall. The result of this is that Wolvey is required to allocate sites for approximately 100 new homes.

Whilst some residents may have strong feelings about this, it is highly likely that this will happen.

The Parish Council therefore feels that Wolvey residents should guide the process, rather than Rugby Borough Council. To this end, the Council's Neighbourhood Plan Group will gather information on local housing needs and identify suitable sites to allow Wolvey to grow in a way that reflects the views of its residents.

Regular meetings will take place for the foreseeable future, and questionnaires will be sent to all households, and opinions sought. The resulting Neighbourhood Plan will be a statutory part of the local planning process, so it is essential that you participate and have your say.

DUMP THE 'DO' OR FACE THE FINE!

Wolvey Parish Council would like the help of all local residents to assist them in eliminating dog fouling. It has been noted to Councillors that the incidence of dog mess in and around our beautiful village has increased significantly recently.

If you see a dog fouling in and around the village and the owner does not pick up the mess, you could report them. Please note as much detail as you can eg: where the mess was left, the breed and/or size and colour of the dog, the address of the owner and ideally a photograph of the dirty 'do'. You can report any offenders at:

The dog owner will not be made aware of the name of the person reporting. Owners face an £80 fine. Let's keep Wolvey clear of dog mess.

As well as serving as Chair of the Council, Bozena has been the driving force behind many initiatives including the Wolvey Plan and this newsletter. She also took a leading role in enabling the setting up of the youth club, the annual Christmas tree lights Big Switch On event and presenting the Council as an open and democratic organisation with a clear corporate identity.

Thank you Bozena for your enthusiasm, energy and hard work. On behalf of the whole village, we wish you well for the future.

TWO PERCENT INCREASE, BUT LESS TO SPEND?

Most residents will by now have received their council tax bill for the 2016/17 financial year. You will have noticed that the bill indicates a 2% increase in the precept set by Wolvey Parish Council. However, this does not mean that Council spending will rise by the same amount in the coming year. In fact, Council spending will increase by less than 1% next year. This is because there has been a real terms reduction of almost £1700 in the actual amount of money raised under Rugby Borough Council's precept formula. In addition, Rugby has cut the council tax support grant by £1000 and Warwickshire County Council has cut the Lengthsman Scheme funding by £500.

New areas of spending include the neighbourhood planning process (most of which will eventually be funded through Government grant

payments) and complying with regulations on pension provision for the Clerk to the Council.

In order to keep the precept increase to a minimum, the Council has looked carefully at spending in a number of areas. Amenities like street lighting maintenance and upgrades, grass cutting and work undertaken under the Lengthsman Scheme have been protected. Most of the reductions in spending are in the areas of professional planning advice and grants and donations to local organisations.

Nevertheless, the Council will continue to support local groups to the tune of £5000, however, Government austerity measures mean that, like other public sector organisations, the Council will remain under considerable financial pressure for the foreseeable future.

DRAFT LOCAL PLAN

Rugby Borough Council has recently published its draft Local Plan that sets out how Rugby will meet its development needs over the next 10 years. Wolvey is one of seven villages in the borough which has been identified as a 'Main Rural Settlement', meaning that the Borough Council thinks that it has facilities which can sustain further new development. Each of these seven villages has been allocated a development of up to 100 new houses. This will have a major impact on the village, and both the Parish Council and its recently formed Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee will play an important role responding to the consultation process and any future development that occurs in the village.

COUNCIL IMPRESSES COUNCILLORS

It's always a pleasure to attend meetings at Wolvey School. Particularly impressive is the School Council where pupils are able to give their views on any issues affecting the school and their education.
