Roles, Responsibilities and Recruitment

Wolvey Parish Council consists of a maximum of seven councillors, elected by Wolvey residents. The most recent election was last year. However, as there was the same number of candidates as vacancies, the current Council was deemed elected so a formal ballot was unnecessary. We are the lowest tier of local government dealing with civil matters. For historical reasons, the electoral boundary of Wolvey Parish Council is largely defined by the area covered by the local parish church - hence the retention of the word in our title. However, there the coincidence and connection with church matters ends.

Councils have a strictly defined remit; we can't make it up as we go along. On election or co-option, we sign up to a national Code of Conduct and a set of Standing Orders that ensure we function lawfully. Although government tiers above us are organised on party political lines we endeavour to, and should remain, neutral and independent.

We are not alone. We are 1 of the 40 Parish Councils in the Rugby Borough Ward and the 9,000 Councils in England. We are also members of the National and Warwickshire Associations of Local Councils that are invaluable sources of help and advice. Training is always available and a couple of years ago when we had some new councillors, the tutor came to us – a great induction for new councillors and a welcome recap for the rest of us.

We are a democratic team. A councillor cannot act or make decisions on behalf of the Council without it being previously agreed they can do so and we are all bound by a majority resolution. This is done at our monthly meetings that are not public but the public is invited to attend as observers. We do however have a slot on the agenda should any residents want to raise any issues. All councillors are equal and the only extra 'powers' the Chair has

are to manage the meetings and a casting vote where a vote is tied. Like all other Councils we must employ a Clerk whose role it is to deal with all administration, financial matters and most importantly ensure that we are functioning within the law. The Clerk does not have a vote.

We spend your money. In order to discharge our duties we get a small part of what you pay in Council Tax. At our annual Budget Meeting we decide how much we will need and then Rugby Borough Council pays it to us. We endeavour to keep it as low as possible. Last year it was £32.000.

Our duties are varied. There's the mundane, such as street lighting and eradicating dog mess and the more enjoyable, such as organising the annual Christmas Tree event, providing defibrillators, coordinating WW1 commemorations, putting on First Aid courses and much more.

We like to maintain good communication links with Wolvey residents, not just to inform you about what we are doing but also to find out the needs of the community we serve. To this end we have this Newsletter, a web site, are now 'tweeting', distribute a Welcome Pack for new residents and have held Open Days. Councillors and the Clerk are just at the end of a phone.

As we are all volunteers, it is inevitable and indeed desirable that there is a turnover of Councillors. New ideas and skills keep the Council vibrant. Two councillors have now retired, so we have two vacancies.

If you want to work with old friends or make new ones and have the satisfaction and fulfilment of benefitting your community at the same time, please apply for co-option.

Summer's Here, Expectations are High

Summer's here at last. Everywhere is beautifully green, hanging baskets are in place, summer bedding is in the tubs, and at last work can begin to repair the boardwalk at the Wetland which has been closed for some months.

Wolvey Environment Group (with some voluntary help from Galliford personnel) will be underpinning the boardwalk treads to make the area safe once more for visitors. The wildlife in the Reserve is abundant at the moment, ducklings, tadpoles, colourful butterflies and birds, a huge growth of grasses and plants. The only sad note is that although the area has been entered for the Rugby in Bloom competition as usual this year, the application may have to be withdrawn.

This is because no maintenance has been carried out during the last year and there is a lot of wild growth. However, that is a decision for another day.

Village Defibrillators Set to Save Lives

Early intervention while awaiting the arrival of emergency services can significantly improve the chances of someone surviving a heart attack. This is why the Parish Council is arranging for two public access defibrillators to be available in the village for emergency use by the general public.

A locked cabinet holding a defibrillator is to be located at the Village Hall. It is planned to place the other one in the school. Both cabinets will be accessible 24/7. They can be opened using a number code which is provided by the ambulance service when an emergency call is made. The defibrillators are portable and can be taken to where they are needed.

The defibrillators are designed to be operated by any person and the machine gives instructions to the operator when activated. When placed in contact with the

patient the defibrillator takes readings and determines whether to issue an electrical shock. This takes the decision making out of the hands of the untrained operator. However, the more familiar and confident the operator is with the equipment the quicker the equipment can be activated and used.



Training on the use of these defibrillators will be arranged by the Council.

Appeal for Nepal

Following the appalling news of the Nepalese earthquakes, Wolvey Parish Council placed a collection box (by kind permission) in the Post Office which raised £85.00. Grateful thanks to everyone who contributed to the collection.

It was also decided that the Parish Council would add £65.00 from the Grants and Donations budget to make a total of £150. This will contribute to the rescue operation and the rebuilding of the devastated area that is home to the families of many of our neighbours at Bramcote Barracks.

Accordingly, a cheque was sent to the DEC Nepal Earthquake Appeal and the generosity of Wolvey residents was reported to staff at Bramcote Barracks.



Superfast Service by 2016



Wolvey's broadband speed is to be upgraded during 2016. CSW Broadband, the project tasked with delivering superfast broadband to the Coventry, Solihull and Warwickshire areas, has produced a delivery plan giving an indication as

to when each village can expect to be upgraded to receive broadband speeds of up to 24Mbps. The current plan is that Wolvey will be converted sometime around the middle of 2016.

ground, hills, crawl nets etc. The trip which was rounded off by a session on the climbing wall - was assisted by funding from the Heart of England Community Foundation.



The Parish Council is providing feedback to the County Council on the usefulness of the Lengthsman Scheme. The County Council is providing funding to operate the scheme for a two year trial period. We would like to include the views of village residents in our replies.

Lengthsman Scheme involves carrying out minor highways works which are unlikely to be dealt with by the County Council. The work has included cutting back hedges off the highway, weed spraying of kerbs and pathways, cleaning road gully grids, litter picking, sign cleaning and removal of fly posters.

The Parish Council now has a new Chairman - at its Annual Meeting, Councillor Andrew Dixon was elected Chairman and Councillor Ruth Buswell was re-elected Vice-Chairman for 2015/16. This means that it is a new era for the Parish Council as it has both a new Chairman and a new Clerk.

The Annual Parish meeting for residents was held on 29th April. The guest speaker was Alison Orr from Rugby Community and Voluntary Action who gave a very interesting presentation on applying for funding – providing helpful tips, hints and advice on completing applications,

together with the pitfalls to avoid. I am sure that those local groups and organisations who attended the meeting found this information very useful.

The Council has considered revisions to its policy on grants to local groups and agreed that the current practice of administering two rounds of grant applications per year be reduced to one round per year. Letters inviting applications will be sent out in June and applications will be considered as follows:

Deadline for applications: 31 August,

Preliminary consideration of applications: September PC meeting,

Decision on grant applications: October PC meeting.

Action on Plans

Progress on implementing the Wolvey Action Plan has been reviewed recently by the Council. We can report that many of the points raised by residents in the original plan have been put into place.

For example, we have implemented the Lengthsman Scheme, put on a First Aid course, looked into additional youth facilities and are now 'twittering' on Council activities. We are also currently in the process of activating the emergency defibrillators scheme, re-instating the Neighbourhood Watch, improving public transport and exploring other uses of social media.

Unfortunately, because of low demand, it has not been possible to implement the befriending buddy system or the dial a ride scheme. Likewise, the planned energy seminar has not yet taken place because there is no access to Wifi in a village community meeting place.

The Council are still considering updating streetlights to make savings and offering computer courses. So, watch this space for news on future activities.
